As I look back on the last 6 years since the Camp Fire, I think about the importance of *partnerships and what critical roles partners play in making wonderful things happen.* While we have always had partners, the Camp Fire redefined, enlarged, and enhanced the important role that partnerships have played in supporting Habitat's impact in Butte County.

With capacity building support from the most amazing partner to *EVERYONE*, North Valley Community Foundation and Habitat International, we have been able to increase our home production by 300% - from 2 homes a year to 8 homes in 2024. We know that these homes come from the hearts and hands of such a wide swath

of partners that they are an essential ingredient, not only to the affordable housing needs of our community, *but the sense of community for all.*

Our incredible board members and dedicated and committed staff propel us forward as we continue to fine tune our operations to build more homes with more families, more volunteers, and more partners. To highlight just a few: our local jurisdictions, state, and federal legislators; the local businesses that donate time, supplies, funds, and other support; volunteers; individual donors; Home Depot Foundation; Insurance Institute for Business and Home Safety (IBHS); and Wells Fargo Bank.

Homeownership Through housing, we empower

Habitat's focus on homeowners expanded as we continued to examine the essential aspects of sustainable homeownership and our connections to the communities in which we build.

The highlight of the Habitat year, of course, are the families who received keys to their new homes. While this would not happen without all the work leading up to the dedication day, these celebrations remain the impetus for everyone.

One new homeowner, Star, told us, "Our journey will transition from mere survival to truly living. I eagerly anticipate the prospect of achieving a work-life balance that enables me to spend more time with my family, granting me a sense of independence and self-sufficiency."



Outreach:

We expanded outreach by participating in various community events, including Ampla Health Fairs, Cesar Chavez celebrations, and veterancentered events.

We also developed an online application form, simplifying the process for individuals applying for a Habitat home.

We hosted an event at one of our homes that had been designated as a "Wildfire Prepared Home Plus" by the Institute for Business & Home Safety (IBHS). We partnered with them to demonstrate how everyone can build in a fire resistant way.

We affirmed our commitment to building Habitat homes that comply with the requirements of the Plus designation, which includes cover gutters, enclosed underside of eaves, noncombustible exterior wall cover, fireresistant windows, and noncombustible decks, and keeping accessory structures at least 30 feet from the home.

Staff:

An added improvement came with a staff Loan Processor, Andrea Pearsall, who is responsible for submitting all homeowner loans and staying informed about new first-time homebuyer opportunities that can benefit our future homeowners.

On-going:

Supportive services for current homeowners continue with a variety of programs. One area of significant growth is our housing counseling services which have grown by 50% as we work with families to develop community connections and get resources they need as homeowners.

Volunteers

The heart of Habitat

Volunteer Coordinator Cory Beynon continued to enhance the volunteer program by earning a Certificate in Volunteer Management through Habitat for Humanity International (HFHI). This additional training led to increased volunteer participation. Some of this year's volunteer groups include Home Depot, LuLus, and the Nor Cal Roller Girls. More volunteers resulted in a hefty jump in volunteer hours--nearly 6,300 hours. The impact of increased volunteers is helping us get more homes built.





Veterans:

Working closely with leaders of various veterans' groups, Habitat continues to set aside a specific day for veterans to volunteer. The 9/11 Day of Service and Remembrance, is a heartfelt opportunity for us to honor not only those we lost but also the brave souls who continue to uphold our safety and freedom—our cherished veterans, dedicated military families, first responders, and the unsung heroes in our communities.

Language:

To improve communication with volunteers and staff, Benyon connected with Spanish language proficient volunteers to assist with translation, both in the office and on construction sites.

ReStore Volunteer:

In collaboration with the Career Center at Butte College, Beynon placed a volunteer in the ReStore for 150 hours of work which led to a scholarship through the Dream Act Incentive Grant Program. This highlights the impact our volunteer partnerships have on individual growth and education.

Traveling Volunteers:

We organized multiple groups from outside the area to travel to Paradise to volunteer, and coordinating their efforts with other local non-profits for multi-day volunteer initiatives. This taps into a population of volunteers who are free to travel and are looking for service opportunities.

The ReStore

Donate, shop, volunteer

The ReStore continues its expansion by developing new relationships with retail giants to purchase truckloads of overstock and then offering these items at 40 to 50 % off. This initiative boosts profitability, generates additional capital by selling high value products, and has increased our customer base.

We continue with one of our core values of sustainability by establishing partnerships with Chico Creative Reuse and the Smash House.



Key Achievements:

- Donation Intake: The ReStore increased donations this year by over 20%: 4,250 delivered donations and 293 donations were picked up from individuals and businesses.
- Recycling Revenue: Continued the partnership with Novelis, the world's largest aluminum recycler. We collected and recycled aluminum, which resulted in an additional \$6,973 in revenue.
- Customer Experience: Introduced a color-coded discounting policy to increase merchandise turnover, enhancing the customer shopping experience.
- Seasonal Hours: Implemented a summer schedule, opening from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. during June, July, and August. Winter hours are 10 a.m to 6 p.m.
- Paint Sales: Both recycled and new paint sales grew this past year: Sold 1,195 gallons of donated paint and 1,219 gallons of recycled paint.
- Vocational Training: Collaborated with Dreamcatchers and AARP to provide vocational training opportunities for 9 individuals.

With the generous support of the community, the ReStore has grown significantly in both income and sustainability, and the resulting funds are critical to support Habitat's mission of building homes, strengthening communities, and fostering hope.

Women Build

Engage, mobilize, train

The 3rd year of Habitat's Women Build Fundraiser continued to grow like a beanstalk! Total funds raised were 41% greater than last year for a grand total of \$45,260 for one weekend in May.

Sponsorship jumped nearly 50%, while peer-to-peer donors grew by 62% for a 44% increase in funds. Participant registration increased by over a third.

This is a significant event in terms of growing community involvement, financial impact, and positive publicity. We cannot over-estimate the value of our partnership with Becky Prator Realty and the expanding support from our local business community. Next year's plans include a bigger and even better Women Build in May 2025 when we will be working on a five home subdivision in Chico.

This year the Women Build Fundraiser was a tremendous success,

with both participation and funds raised surpassing previous years. Despite varied weather—sunshine on Friday and a storm on Saturday—everyone came prepared and accomplished a significant amount of work.

- We had 52 participants.
- We nearly doubled donations to \$38,025 in business sponsorships from 31 companies along with generous in-kind donations from Upper Crust, Beatnik's, and Save Mart.
- The event generated \$1,960 in registration fees, \$4,240 from peer-to-peer fundraising, \$750 in donations from non-participants, and \$325 from staff fundraising.
- The Women Build made \$45,300, marking a 41% increase over last year's total.


We are incredibly grateful to all that make this event possible.
